Congratulations Brooklyn Martin and Brandon Kober! Exceptional local nursing students recognized with scholarships from NHH

NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY, Thursday, June 7th, 2018—Nursing students **Brooklyn Martin** and **Brandon Kober** are the recipients of Northumberland Hills Hospital's 2018 Health Professions Scholarships.

Presented tonight by NHH Board Chair Elizabeth Selby at the opening of the Board of Director's June meeting, the scholarships were first introduced in 2003 to assist students from west Northumberland who have chosen to pursue a career in the health-care sector.

"By helping our local students achieve their academic goals, we hope to encourage them to consider opportunities at NHH when the time comes to select an employer," said Selby.

In addition to being enrolled or accepted for enrollment in a full-time study program, applicants are evaluated on a combination of criteria, including:

academic achievements;
extra-curricular activities;
a letter explaining their career goals; and
written references.

"Once again, our 2018 applicants demonstrated a very inspiring combination of commitment to their community and academic skill," said Selby.

Details of the 2018 scholarship winners' achievements were shared as follows at the evening presentation.

Brooklyn Martin has just completed her first year of university studies. She is presently pursuing an undergraduate degree in Nursing Science at Queen's University, in Kingston.

A graduate of St. Mary's Catholic Secondary School in Cobourg, Brooklyn finished her high school studies with a final average of 91—high honours.

In addition to maintaining excellent grades, Brooklyn was active in a large number of extracurricular activities, including the Duke of Edinburgh program, the environmental club, the ski club, the basketball team and the soccer club/team.

On the honour roll for each of her four years of high school, Brooklyn was the recipient of a Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award and a Queen's University Excellence Scholarship, all while contributing volunteer hours to a broad range of local sport, education, church and health care organizations in our region.

In her application, Brooklyn spoke very enthusiastically about her chosen line of study and the health-care field in general. Her work ethic and strength of character earned her high praise from those who endorsed her application with references. Drew Quemby, one of Brooklyn's teachers at St. Mary's, describes her as "an exemplary student with an innate ability to lead and learn, and in addition, she has a sincere desire for helping others."

Brandon Kober, who grew up in Castleton, is also a student at Queen's University. He is also working towards his Bachelor of Science in Nursing, having already completed a Bachelor of Science in kinesiology. He started his nursing studies in September 2016 and completed his second year this spring.

Dr. Kevin Woo, an associate professor in the Queen's School of Nursing and School of Rehabilitation, offered the following context on Brandon in his letter of endorsement submitted this winter:

"I have known Brandon for the last two years. He has worked for me as a research assistant on several research projects. It is with great pleasure that I am writing to nominate him for the NHH scholarship. Brandon had completed a degree in kinesiology in 2016 prior to studying nursing. He developed an interest in nursing through his experience as a volunteer at Kingston General Hospital Emergency Room in 2014/15, as well as Northumberland Hills Hospital in 2016....[H]e is deeply impressed and inspired by the role that nurses play to promote patient centered care and actualize desirable health outcomes. He has dedicated his career to nursing"

Described as a fast learner with an impressive attention to detail, Brandon has also earned a reputation as a strong researcher. Dr. Woo praised his work co-authoring two posters that were presented at a large US-based wound care conference.

Both recipients are considering furthering their studies to ultimately become Registered Nurse Practitioners—a specialty in high demand here in Northumberland and across the province.

"The values and commitment to excellence that both these students share are a tribute to the support they've received from their families, teachers and mentors," said Selby in her concluding remarks. "Please join us in congratulating them, and their families, on their achievements. We wish them all the best as they work toward their goals."
