OH! WHAT A NIGHT.... Caring for Generations Donor Wall Unveiled at the Northumberland Hills Hospital

The stars came out on October 2nd at the Northumberland Hills Hospital as the curtain came down on the Caring for Generations Donor Wall. The wall, sponsored by William and Delphine Patchett, was unveiled to the thrill of many of the people who helped make the dream of a new hospital a reality. The Caring for Generations Donor Wall is prominently located near the hospital's main entrance, and pays tribute to the hundreds of individuals, families, businesses, community groups and organizations that have contributed \$1000 or more since January 1, 2000 to the Northumberland Hills Hospital.

The wall, designed by Deborah Burgess of Octopus Design & Communications in Cobourg, is a living monument. This means the names could change location and new names could be added as future donations are made to the Northumberland Hills Hospital Foundation.

The wall currently features more than 900 names in different categories: –friend, sponsor, patron, humanitarian, founder, benefactor and platinum, gold and silver circles.

WHAT IS CT SCANNING?

CT (computed tomography), sometimes called CAT scan, uses special x-ray equipment to obtain image data from different angles around the body, and then uses computer processing of the digitized data to show a cross-section of body tissues and organs. The data can be manipulated by a computer, giving physicians the ability to view internal structures from any direction.

CT imaging is particularly useful because it can show several types of tissue – lung, bone, soft tissue, and blood vessels – with great clarity. Using specialize equipment and expertise to create and interpret CT scans of the body, radiologists can more easily diagnose problems such as cancers, cardiovascular disease, infectious disease, trauma and musculoskeletal disorders.

In 2002, over 500 patients were transferred from the hospital in Cobourg with nursing escort to Peterborough for a CT scan costing thousands of dollars.

The CT scan is now in operation at the Northumberland Hills Hospital. By donating to the "Light Up a Life" Campaign, you can help complete the purchase of this essential diagnostic tool.

Stepping inside the Northumberland Hills Hospital, it doesn't take long for patients and visitors to discover the wide array of state-of-the-art equipment that is now available to our local communities. From a new CT scanner to electric beds, new technology will offer exciting new possibilities for patient care at the hospital.

It's important to note, however, that medical equipment typically requires upgrading every five to ten years. At the Northumberland Hills Hospital Foundation, our goal is to create a strong philanthropic program that will allow us to keep our hospital on the leading edge well into the future.

Members of our local communities are always asking how they can help keep Northumberland Hills Hospital at the forefront of new medical technology. One of the easiest and most rewarding ways to do this is through the *Caring for Generations Society. A SPECIAL GIFT...

The Foundation is pleased to be the recipient of a special gift made last month by Gertrude J. Taylor. Gertrude has a long and proud history with health care in Northumberland County. In fact, she was one of the first-ever Registered Nurses to graduate from the nursing program in Cobourg. At 97 years young, Gertrude can re-tell stories of "country nursing" in Campbellford right after graduation. Along with Dr. Longmore, they would travel into the country on a house call with skis on the front of the car. During only her second house call, she remembers setting the kitchen of the home up as an operating reoom, and assisting with a tonsillectomy.

Gertrude also remembers working long hours for little pay – \$2 for 12 hours to be exact!

In 1971, at the age of 65, Gertrude retired from her nursing career, however, she was an active volunteer with the Canadian Cancer Society, the Order of the Eastern Star and the Hospital Auxiliary.

Gertrude wanted to make her donation in memory of her first husband, George S. Walker (deceased 1934), her second husband Lewis E. Taylor (deceased 1982), and her daughter Helen (Walker) Hardy, deceased 1996.
