San'yas - Indigenous Cultural Competency Training opportunity thanks to the Central East LHIN

NHH staff members are participating this month in a unique professional development opportunity made possible through the Central East Local Health Integration Network (Central East LHIN).

San'yas: Indigenous Cultural Safety Training is a facilitated and interactive program created to deliver training to health care professionals and administrators working with Indigenous people. The 8-hour, online course is organized into modules covering a broad range of topics, including: cultural diversity of Canada's Indigenous people, colonization, stereotyping, the culture of profession and skills for enhancing cultural competency. Students do their work entirely online, but they are assigned to discussion groups with a team facilitator, thus permitting the dynamic of an in-person course. With the goal of enhancing knowledge, awareness and skills needed to improve the quality of health care services to Indigenous people, it is the first training opportunity of its kind for NHH and very much appreciated by the dozen individuals currently enrolled. NHH looks forward to future opportunities of this kind via the LHIN moving forward.

Mental Health Week

The first week of May is Mental Health Week in Canada, and NHH's Community Mental Health team has prepared a public display beside the Main Street Bistro. Stop by this week for information on NHH's community mental health services, facts about mental health and mental illness and much more.

World of Mental Health training

Two mental health education days were hosted recently for staff in NHH's Community Mental Health Services office on Elgin Street. Supported by the NHH Foundation, the sessions have been designed following staff input gathered through a comprehensive **Mental Health Needs Assessment Survey** last summer. Topics covered include: the impact of stigma, strategies for working with clients with mental health issues, including goal setting, building a therapeutic relationship and communication strategies, as well as an introduction to concurrent disorders and suicide intervention.

Delivered by members of NHH's own Community Mental Health team, the sessions were extremely successful, and the participants expressed through the post-evaluations that they felt more confident and better able to implement these new strategies into their daily roles across the hospital. More sessions are being coordinated

for the coming months with an aim to spread the training to as many as possible across the NHH interdisciplinary team.

NHH ducklings (X13)

Operational Excellence

2017/18 Quality Improvement Plan priorities established

As in past years, our Plan is published in two parts. The QIP **Workplan** states, at a high level, specific quality and safety improvement priorities set for fiscal year 2017/18. A separate but related **Narrative** document provides local and provincial context.

A public set of commitments aligned with system and provincial priorities, the QIP is an important tool used by hospitals across Ontario to continually improve the quality and safety of patient care through focused targets and actions. Every hospital in the province is required by the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care to submit a QIP to Health Quality Ontario (HQO), the provincial advisor on health care quality.

NHH's 2017/18 QIP includes nine priority indicators for care in five "quality dimensions":

- effective;
- efficient;
- patient-centred;
- safe; and
- timely.

Informed by patient/caregiver input, NHH identified these nine indicators as key to our ability to advance quality patient care.

The QIP is one part of NHH's continuous quality and safety improvement processes.

Update on Basic Income Pilot - Ontario

As confirmed in a recent announcement from Premier Kathleen Wynne, Ontario is launching a pilot project to assess whether a basic income can better support vulnerable workers, improve health and education outcomes for people on low incomes, and help ensure that everyone shares in Ontario's economic growth. The three-year study will test how a basic income might expand opportunities and job prospects of those living on low incomes, while providing greater security for them and their families. NHH was pleased to participate in a local consultation to inform planning earlier this year.

In a news release earlier this month, Ontario has confirmed the selection of three locations for the province's pilot:

- □ Hamilton, Brantford, Brant County
- Thunder Bay and the surrounding area
- Lindsay.

Participants will receive:

- Up to \$16,989 per year for a single person, less 50 per cent of any earned income
- Up to \$24,027 per year for a couple, less 50 per cent of any earned income
- Up to an additional \$6,000 per year for a person with a disability.

A basic income supports people to begin or continue working, or to further their education. Participants in the pilot will be able to increase their total income by combining a basic income with income they earn through work. The basic income amount will decrease by \$0.50 for every dollar an individual earns through work.

Ontario is also in the early stages of planning a separate, parallel First Nations Basic Income Pilot, co-created and designed with First Nations partners.

NHH recognized with Green Health Care Award



NHH has been recognized once again with a Green Health Care Award (silver level).

The 2016 Ontario Green Health Care Awards were announced Tuesday April 25th at a virtual awards presentation held by the Canadian Coalition for Green Health Care.

The Green Health Care Awards are predicated upon the Green Hospital Scorecard (GHS), a comprehensive 'Made in Canada' health care benchmarking tool that measures energy and water conservation, waste management and recycling, corporate commitment and pollution prevention for Ontario hospitals. Participating facilities report on their environmental and sustainability initiatives through an online questionnaire. Every participating hospital receives an individualized Scorecard which summarizes their environmental performance from year to year and relative to their peers.

Ninety-one Ontario hospital sites completed the 2016 GHS survey, which reports on data from the 2015 calendar year. The wide range of facility sizes and types provided award hosts with new insights into how health care facilities operate, and where opportunities for improvement to environmental stewardship lie.

The awards program honoured the top performing hospitals in Energy, Water, and Waste categories, and recognized runners-up in each division.

NHH ranks among the top 5 overall scorers for this year's program. As well, NHH also received one of the top five scores in both the Water and Waste categories.
