15 seconds can prevent infections

Everyone plays an important role in preventing infections in the hospital – including visitors. That's why visitors were the focus of Stop! Clean Your Hands Day on Monday, May 6th at Northumberland Hills Hospital when NHH's infection prevention and control practitioner Denise Kearsey roamed the hospital asking visitors to take the "15-second challenge" to clean their hands using hand sanitizer.

"NHH has a very strong hand hygiene culture among staff. Our audits this past year show high compliance rates at 95 per cent." says Myonne Allan, Director of Quality at NHH. "This year, we joined health care facilities around the world on May 6th to take the hand hygiene message outside the hospital. This is a great opportunity to remind our visitors that we ALL play an important part in keeping patients, staff and visitors safe from infections. The 15-second challenge is a fun way to go about that.'

Alcohol-based hand sanitizers are an effective way to safely remove germs when hands are not visibly soiled, but only if they are used properly. "Many do not realize that it takes a minimum of 15 seconds of vigorously rubbing your hands together to effectively remove germs," said Allan. "This is key for anyone coming to visit patients at the hospital. Proper hand hygiene is the most important way to stop the spread of germs to patients and to your family members when you leave the hospital and go home," she explains.

Hand sanitizer stations are available throughout NHH and visitors are reminded to wash their hands:

- when they enter the hospital;
- before going into a patient's room;
- when they leave a patient's room; and
- as they exit the hospital.

Every year, more than 220,000 incidents of health care-associated infections occur in Canada.

"Hand hygiene is a simple way for visitors to keep patients safe and stop the spread of germs," says Allan. "It only takes 15 seconds!"

An important notice to our community about mammography services at **Northumberland Hills Hospital**

A new Cancer Care Ontario research study on mammography has found digital direct radiography (DR) and screen film to be more effective at detecting breast cancer than digital computed radiography (CR).

Patients who come to NHH for mammography examinations can be confident that they are receiving the highest quality of care with the best technology currently available.

Thanks to the support of generous donors in our community, Northumberland Hills Hospital's Clay & Elaine Elliott Women's Health Centre has been providing digital direct radiography (DR) mammography since February 2006. Prior to this, NHH used screen film technology. Digital computed radiography (CR) has never been offered at NHH.

To learn more about mammography services at NHH, including the Ontario Breast Screening Program (OBSP) service, please visit the Diagnostic Imaging area of our website under the Patients tab at www.nhh.ca.

OBSP is a province-wide initiative designed to ensure Ontario women receive the benefits of regular breast screening. Free of charge to eligible women between the ages of 50 and 74, the program is operated by Cancer Care Ontario (CCO) and funded by the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care. No doctor's requisition is required to access OBSP. Eligible women, including those without a local family physician, may self-refer. The program is offered in more than 150 locations throughout the province, including NHH.
