NHH's Ontario Breast Screening Program Celebrating 2nd Anniversary Next Month

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month in Ontario, and with good reason. Breast cancer is the most common female cancer and the second leading cause of cancer deaths in women. In 2011, it is estimated that 9,000 Ontario women will be diagnosed with breast cancer; 1,980 will die from the disease in this province.

Screening finds breast cancer earlier, when most women have more treatment options and an improved chance of survival. Research shows that regular screening of women aged 50 to 69 can reduce deaths from breast cancer by at least 30%. Breast cancer death rates for Ontario women have decreased by 24% between 1990 and 2008 for women aged 50 to 74. This is the result of both increased screening with mammography, and better treatment.1

Two years ago this fall NHH expanded its mammography service with the introduction of an important new addition: the Ontario Breast Screening Program (OBSP). Since that time, close to 5,000 screening mammograms have been performed at NHH through OBSP, improving local access to

routine breast screening and, by extension, survival rates.

A province-wide screening program, OBSP is operated by Cancer Care Ontario (CCO) and funded by the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care. All Ontario women between the ages of 50 and 74 are eligible for the OBSP here at NHH, providing they have not had a mammogram within the last 11 months, have no acute breast symptoms, no personal history of breast cancer and no current breast implants. Those new to our area, who have attended an OBSP affiliate in another centre can come to NHH for their next and future biennial routine OBSP mammography examinations. NHH will make the necessary arrangements to have any previous mammography studies transferred.

Health System Reform

Message from Robert Biron, President and CEO



The pressures facing our current health care system are well known. So too are our collective goals, including access, quality and sustainability

In June, the Ontario Hospital Association (OHA) the Ontario Association of Community Care Access Centres (OACCAC) released a thought-provoking policy paper on health care reform.

Direct in its tone and presentation, Four Pillars: Recommendations Achieving a High Performing

Health System proposes reforms grounded on four pillars, namely:

- 1) Setting ambitious goals:
- 2) Planning properly;

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- 3) Letting evidence drive care decisions; and
- 4) Connecting care.

Fifteen recommendations are made in the document, beginning with a call for the government to set medium- and long-term goals with specific performance targets, "so that health care providers can effectively contribute to their achievement, and the public can understand where our health system is headed and why," and concluding with a recommendation to increase funding for the community sector to "facilitate a cost-effective shift of service, resulting in a positive impact on hospital utilization and better care of patients.

I recommend the Four Pillars report to anyone in our community with an interest in our health care system and the priorities that lie ahead.
