Cobourg Police Service delivers active shooter training across NHH

The month of April saw a further strengthening of our collaboration with Cobourg Police Service as officers from the local force deployed departmental and hospital-wide active shooter training to staff, physicians and volunteers across the hospital.

A key action initiated after the October 27th 2017 incident in the NHH Emergency Department, the intensive training began with departmental exercises, on various shifts. NHH policies were reviewed and Cobourg Police Service provided basic instruction on how to minimize risk and maximize safety should an active shooter situation occur. On April 26th a hospital-wide mock exercise was conducted under the review of police, senior staff and observers.

Both the hospital-wide and department exercises received very positive feedback from Cobourg Police Service, which customized training used commonly in schools for a hospital environment, as well as staff. Starting first at the department level and then following with an opportunity to 'test' that organization-wide response proved to be a good approach. Police observers said:

"It was a good mock exercise and went really well – one of the best I've seen."

"Staff reacted the way they should and it was very successful and amazing to see."

"It was a ghost town, an environment you want to create if you are in active shooter situation."

NHH extends a very special thanks to the Cobourg Police Services team, as well as NHH Quality leads Elizabeth Vosburgh, VP, Corporate Services, and Rohan Gonsalves, Director, Quality and Safety. Also recognized for her work on the enhanced training initiative was Anna Marie Sutherland, Program Director for the NHH Emergency Department.

A further hospital-wide exercise is planned at NHH for this June. More information on the exact time and date will be forthcoming.

Great Place to Work and Volunteer

NHH volunteers recognized with annual National Volunteer Week celebration

National Volunteer Week was being recognized across Canada last month and on April 18th volunteers from the hospital came together in the Education Centre for an annual celebration of volunteers and volunteering.

From fund-raising to governance, way-finding to quality improvement, spiritual care to a heart-warming hello, more than 600 volunteers play an essential part in the daily operation of NHH.

Recognizing the past year's achievements of all its volunteer groups, NHH opened the celebration with a tribute to the outstanding \$2.6 million in community donations raised through the work of NHH Foundation volunteers in the past year—an achievement that surpassed the Foundation's annual target for the year of \$2.28 million. Hospital beds, trauma stretchers and vital signs monitors are just a few of the pieces of much-needed equipment the hospital was able to purchase this year as a result. Under the guidance of **Executive Director Rhonda Cunningham**, **Foundation Board Chair Tyler Hathway** and team, the volunteers continue to answer the 'ask' placed upon them in creative new ways and the community is all the better for this.

Likewise, the volunteers of the NHH Auxiliary, led by **President Pat Page-Hoisak**, were recognized: "dedicated individuals of all ages who work alongside hospital staff every day supporting the work of virtually every department."

Highlighted was the recent expansion of the Auxiliary's service to establish a new team dedicated to the orientation of incoming patients to the hospital's busy Medical/Surgical (2B) unit. Also recognized was the Auxiliary's steadfast commitment to many long-standing activities, including their Inquiry Desk service, operation of the hospital's on-site retail operation—The Little Treasure Shop—and, under the leadership of volunteer **Lorrie Phipps**, management of Petticoat Lane, the thrift shop on Munroe Street in Cobourg.

Combined, the NHH Auxiliary—through its retail operations and other fund-raising efforts—raised \$200,000 for the hospital's high priority equipment needs in the past year alone.

Another very dedicated group was recognized at the celebration: NHH's volunteer Board of Directors.

The Board, and its community committee volunteers, are called upon to dedicate hundreds of hours of service to the governance of the organization each year, monitoring strategic priorities, quality and fiscal health. Gratitude was expressed to attendees **Elizabeth Selby**, NHH Board Chair, Vice Chair **Pam Went** (who also leads the Board's Governance Committee) and community committee member **Barry Gutteridge** to pass along to their fellow Board members.

Many other generous individuals support NHH beyond the larger groups of the Foundation, Auxiliary and Board volunteers and all were recognized at yesterday's event, including student volunteers, volunteers with NHH's growing network of spiritual care volunteers (represented by **Janice Buck** and **Dr. Ewen Butler**), and dedicated volunteers with the local St. John Ambulance Therapy Dog program who visit NHH daily with their pets.

Now in its second year, NHH's Patient and Family Advisory Council was also represented and recognized. These volunteer advisors are bringing the patient and caregiver voice to quality improvement and decision making across the hospital, with seats at program-based Quality and Practice Committees, special project tables as well as the full Council table. **Mary McLeod**, **Barry Vail** and **Irene Kavanagh**, who work with medicine, surgical services and emergency reams respectively, represented PFAC at yesterday's celebration.

The keynote address, entitled "Honouring Your Giving Self," was delivered by Maryanne Brown.

An advanced practice nurse with 35 years' experience in gerontology, Brown has a Masters of Science from the Faculty of Nursing at the University of Toronto and a research focus on interventions for people with dementia. She has presented at numerous provincial, national and international conferences and was introduced to NHH eight years ago as a geriatric specialist.

For the past 20 years, Brown has also operated an active practice in the healing arts—specifically, energy and energy psychotherapy. It was in this capacity that she spoke to the NHH volunteers, bringing the message that "volunteers cannot give fully to others unless they also take care of themselves."

New phone system successfully implemented

NHH migrated to a new state-of-the-art telephone system on Wednesday, April 4th. All telephone numbers and extensions remain the same. The benefits of the upgrade include the following:

Peterborough Regional and Ross Memorial hospitals commit to further exploring integration opportunities

A media release was issued last week (Tuesday, April 24th) by our Central East LHIN colleagues at Peterborough Regional Health Centre (PRHC) and Ross Memorial Hospital (RMH) in Lindsay. For details, see: <u>https://www.prhc.on.ca/cms/integration</u>

Following direction from the Central East LHIN, PRHC and RMH have begun a process to explore integration opportunities. This includes exploration of opportunities including the delivery of clinical and front-line services, back-office functions, leadership and governance.

This is a significant development within our North East Sub Region.

NHH, for its part, continues to work closely with Campbellford Memorial Hospital in exploring partnership opportunities that would result in benefits to patients across Northumberland. The opportunities found to date have involved some back-office functions and several shared roles. Last week's announcement from PRHC and Ross demonstrates the ongoing interest—and obligation—for Ontario hospitals to look for opportunities to partner. As the news release states, "under current provincial legislation, both the Central East LHIN and the hospitals within it have a legal duty to identify and explore opportunities for integration of the services we provide for patients."

PRHC and Ross have begun accepting community input on the proposed integration. It will take some time for their process to unfold. Further information will be shared as it becomes available.

Clinical Information System

Within the last month, Central East LHIN acute care hospitals jointly developed and issued both a notification to the market place regarding a forthcoming Request for Proposal (RFP) for a Clinical Information System and issued that RFP to the market.

A Clinical Information System securely manages electronic patient records in a manner that provides the necessary access for a given patient's interdisciplinary care team. When in place, this system will harmonize all the necessary decision making and reporting information. This exciting step for NHH has been years in planning and its absence continues to present challenges for clinicians. Some care providers are able to electronically document and share critical information, while doctors and other care providers still need to rely on handwritten records in paper charts, making follow-up, contextual decision making, and appropriate and secure information sharing difficult. Our current system has been in use for 20 years and it cannot effectively take us to a fully electronic record. We need to modernize the technology and position our patients well for the next 15-20 years. Many other hospitals in the province have rapidly advanced their progress and provided many benefits to patients as a result.

NHH looks forward to the vendor responses to our RFP over the coming months. Our regional review process is extensive and will involve many clinicians in the review process from our own organization and our partners. Over the summer months we will be evaluating written vendor responses. In the fall we will be holding and evaluating extensive vendor demonstrations and presentations. By this time next year, we should be deep in negotiations with our preferred vendor. Further updates will follow as this process progresses.
