Local students' achievements recognized with Health Professions Scholarships

NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY, Thursday, May 7th, 2015 — The recipients of Northumberland Hills Hospital's annual Health Professions Scholarships were announced at the Board's May meeting earlier this evening. **Charlotte Ley**, of Cobourg, and **Kelsey Elchuk**, of Campbellcroft, were both recognized with awards for \$1,000.

The scholarship program was introduced by Northumberland Hills Hospital (NHH) in 2003.

"By helping local students achieve their academic goals, we hope to encourage them to consider opportunities at NHH when the time comes to select an employer," said Board Chair Jack Russell, who presented the awards.

Charlotte Ley

Charlotte, who is currently in her third year of university, is pursuing an undergraduate degree in Health Studies at Queen's University in Kingston.

A graduate of Cobourg District Collegiate Institute West, Charlotte finished her high school studies with a strong 83 per cent average. In their letter of endorsement, one of her former teachers described Charlotte as "an exemplary student, person and role model."

In addition to her commitment to her studies, Charlotte is very committed to her community.

While in high school, she volunteered her time in support of many school events and local fundraisers, including the Rotary Club of Cobourg Sportsman's Night Dinner and the NHH Foundation Gala.

As a summer intern with the Northumberland Family Health Team, and a member of the hospital's VIP program for students, Charlotte had the opportunity to shadow a variety of health professionals.

Charlotte credits her experience observing an NHH respiratory therapist for cementing her decision to pursue a career in the same field.

Very enthusiastic about her current studies at Queen's, Charlotte is looking forward to completing her undergraduate degree next summer and pursuing the additional studies necessary to achieve her goal of respiratory therapy.

Kelsey also credits NHH with "being a large part of what influenced [her] desire to pursue a career in the health care field."

Also at Queen's, Kelsey is currently enrolled in her second year of the Nursing Science program.

Coincidently, Kesley—who hails from Campbellcroft—is a graduate of CDCI West as well. She graduated in June 2013 with a final average of 95 per cent.

Though only in her second year, Kelsey has already received three awards from Queen's, including the Alice J. Baumgart Outstanding Achievement Award and Queen's Appeal Undergraduate Scholarship.

An active volunteer in high school Kelsey continues to give back to her community, now volunteering at the Kingston Humane Society. She is a member of many university clubs and—somehow—she also finds time to tutor first-year nursing students.

Among Kelsey's local volunteer work was a stint at NHH, where she volunteered in the Emergency Department.

Kelsey plans to complete the nursing program at Queen's and write the certification test to become a Registered Nurse.

She then hopes to work for several years to strengthen her skills and gain experience, and eventually return to Queen's to become a nurse practitioner or a physician. Ultimately, she wants to work in the Emergency Room or Operating Room of a hospital.

Mental health care, chemotherapy, dialysis and 16 other ambulatory care clinics are offered on an outpatient basis through partnerships with regional centres and nearby specialists. The hospital serves the catchment area of west Northumberland County.
